



Update on Transfer of Juvenile

### P.A. 17-2 of the June Sp. Sess. - Section 321

- States that there will be no more delinquency commitments to DCF as of 7/1/2018.
- Effective 7/1/2018, authorizes the court to sentence children who have been convicted as delinquent to a period of probation that may include placement in a residential facility, in addition to the existing menu of orders and conditions available to the court.



### **Implementation of Section 321**

- Legislation is needed to provide the statutory authorization for the new options to replace delinquency commitment to DCF
- Workgroup that includes Judicial Branch, Public Defender and State's Attorney representatives has been working to create the framework



### **Implementation of Section 321**

Guided by the legislation and the work of the JJPOC, the workgroup has drafted language that will put in place a juvenile justice process that:

- Is rehabilitation oriented
- Is guided by juveniles' risks and needs
- Includes a system of graduated sanctions
- Addresses public safety concerns



### **Implementation of Section 321**

### **Highlights of Proposed Legislation:**

- Disposition Two categories of Probation may be ordered by the Court:
  - Probation Supervision in the Community (traditional probation)
  - Probation Supervision with Residential Placement in a secure or staff-secure facility, which includes a period of supervision in the community



# Implementation of Section 321 Highlights of Proposed Legislation:

- Maximum Term of Probation:
  - 18 months
  - Extension for additional 12 months possible, with court order
- No longer a 4-year supervision option
  - Research does not support longer periods of supervision
  - In recent years only a small percentage of juveniles have been sentenced to that length of supervision



### **Implementation of Section 321**

### **Highlights of Proposed Legislation:**

Changes to language enacted in 1995:

- "Convicted" changed to "adjudicated" throughout the statutes
- "Serious juvenile repeat offender" statute repealed Rarely used
- Statutes regarding goals and mandates amended & consolidated to reflect current research and practice



### **Implementation of Section 321**

### **Highlights of Proposed Legislation:**

- Definitions added for clarity and consistency
- Any change in a child's liberty status must be approved by a judge
- Adds juvenile residential facilities, in addition to juvenile detention centers, to the statute governing education for children in residential placements



## P.A. 17-2 of the June Sp. Sess. - Section 322:

- Requires the Judicial Branch to expand its contracted juvenile justice services to include a comprehensive system of graduated responses with an array of services, sanctions and secure placements.
- Array will be available for the court and juvenile probation to use to:
  - Provide individualized supervision, care, accountability and treatment;
  - Deter the child from the commission of any further delinquent acts;

• Ensure public safety.

# Update on Juvenile Transfer

### **Implementation of Section 322:**

### **Anticipated Array of Community-Based Programs**

- Rebid Child, Youth and Family Support Centers (CYFSC) early to provide greater emphasis on connections to natural ecologies
- Increase the cognitive-behavioral group offerings (curricula) throughout the service continuum
- Expand evidence-based, in-home programs
  - Multisystemic Therapy (MST)
  - Treatment Foster Care Oregon (TFCO)
  - Functional Family Therapy (FFT)



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### **Implementation of Section 322:**

### **Anticipated Array of Community-Based Programs**

- Educational and Vocational Support Services
  - Educational Support Services (ESS) being implemented now
  - Vocational Support Services (VSS) in development
- Increase Flex Funds
  - For highly individualized wrap-around services, and to address basic needs
- Continued reliance on existing programs



### **Implementation of Section 322:**

### **Anticipated Array of Residential Programs**

- Bidding secure and staff secure Re-Entry, Goal-oriented, Individualized Opportunity to Nurture Success (REGIONS) programs
- Exploring options to secure access to Journey House
- Bidding per diem beds for diversity of service array and efficiency
- New Helping Adolescent Males In Learning Their Options Now (HAMILTON) Program ramping up
- Continued reliance on most existing programs


### P.A. 17-2 of the June Sp. Sess. - Section 323:

- Provides a transitional period from 7/1/18 1/1/19 when the Judicial Branch may continue to utilize DCF placements and services for children who have been convicted as delinquent – a "safety net"
- Requires DCF to enter into an agreement with the Judicial Branch to allow this
- Requires the Judicial Branch to pay DCF for the cost of those services



### **Implementation of Section 323**

- JB has been meeting regularly with OPM and DCF to facilitate a smooth transition
- Discussions and problem-solving regarding a number of issues, including the option of the Judicial Branch using DCF services/beds after 7/1/18, if necessary
  - If needed, an MOA to facilitate this can be executed expeditiously
- Meetings will continue throughout the legislative session so that issues can be addressed as they arise




### Update on Connecticut Juvenile Training School Closure

## CJTS Closure Status Update



- Current Census
  - 25 Youth
  - 16 Youth planned for discharge to home with wraparound supports
  - 3 Youth on census by June 2018
- Program Availability
  - 2 Operating units as of 2/15/18
  - Clinical programming, education, home passes and recreation continue with no disruption
- Ombudsman on site once a week
- Next steps:
  - Continue discharge planning for youth and coordinate staff transitions

# JJPOC Strategic Planning Recap




- JJPOC was engaged in two strategic planning meetings facilitated by Leal Chester in July and September 2017.
- Brainstormed list of focus areas which were than put into a survey that the JJPOC completed.
- Survey identified the top 3 priority focus areas
  - 1st priority- Improve reentry & reintegration (as a continuum) tied with Ensure smooth closure of CJTS/ appropriate alternatives
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> priority- Address needs in the "front-end" of the system (prevention and diversion)
  - 3<sup>rd</sup> priority- Improve early identification of high-risk


# JJPOC Strategic Planning Next Steps
