


MARVIN K. PETERSON LIBRARY NEWSLETTER WELCOME BACK! FALL 2018

University of New Haven Digital Repository

<u>Students</u>: would you like to see some of the books and papers your professors have published? That might make it easier to understand their classes or select a project advisor. Digital Commons @ New Haven (digitalcommons.newhaven.edu) is the University of New Haven's institutional repository. A repository is an online home for an institution's publications, where they can be preserved, organized and shared. Roseanne Krzanowski, Whitney Nelson and Evelina Yim maintain the repository in addition to their other work serving students. They showcase and archive the fine scholarship that our faculty produces. You can browse by department or author name. Digital Commons @ New Haven is part of the worldwide Digital Commons Network.





Digital Repository Fun facts:

- * Of over 900 authors worldwide in the Forensic Science & Technology Commons on the Digital Commons Network, two of our faculty members consistently appear in the top 10.
- * The repository has attracted over 34,000 downloads, in 172 countries, in just the past year.
- * Besides journal articles, faculty publications include books, chapters, conference papers, art exhibition books and major-label CDs.

Librarians at the Marvin K. Peterson library are always looking for new innovative ways to help students be successful researchers. Here are 2 new programs that have been implemented this fall.

Researcher –2—Researcher

Are you a student who needs help with research and would rather work with a fellow student rather than a librarian? The library's Researcher-2-Researcher program was developed with your needs in mind. The library has hired and extensively trained 2 students to help other students with their research needs. If you want to request a research appointment with a Researcher-2-Researcher student, fill out the Research Request Consultation form on the library website:

Virtual Reference with Zoom!

Busy students and faculty members needing help navigating databases and library resources now have the option to request "virtual" help. A librarian can hold a Zoom video conferencing meeting with you. There is the option to simultaneously have a chat session while the librarian views your screen to guide you or troubleshoot issues.
