DATABASE NEWS



The UNH library now has access to an expanded collection of multiple EBSCO databases. This has dramatically increased the number of scholarly and trade journals, magazines, and newspapers in our collection. EBSCO is the publisher that offers titles already familiar to students and faculty such as Criminal Justice Abstracts w/ Full Text, SocINDEX, PsychINFO, PsychARTICLES, GreenFILE, and much more. When entering any EBSCO database, the main interface (screen) will look the same. Even though the old databases will look the same, they will contain new additional titles and articles full text. It also includes a way to search across multiple databases at once.

The addition of multidisciplinary databases such as **Academic Search Premier**, **MainFILE**, and **MasterFILE** provides additional content across more subject areas, with more relevant results than Academic OneFILE, a database previously available in the collection. Millions of articles are available full-text, and the default option is now set to retrieve full text articles. Also, EBSCO allows users to search across multiple databases at once, increasing the number of results and providing easier access for the user. When entering an EBSCO database, for example, Academic Search Premier, click on the hyperlink above the search bar that says, "Choose Database." It will take you to a list of all the EBSCO databases in our collection; to add a database to the search, click on the box next to the database name. That's it. The results that are retrieved will include all the additional databases that were selected. Finally, EBSCO offers an app for all mobile devices, including tablets. From the main interface, click on the hyperlink titled, "iPhone and Android Apps," and follow the simple directions. As a student or faculty, you will have access to all the UNH EBSCO databases from your device. Searching our database collection has never been this easy.

CITATION MADE EASIER

Citing your sources in a list of references or bibliography can be a breeze. Many databases now have the option to generate a citation in APA, MLA or other citation formats as well. After running your search in a database and selecting a great article, look for a link that says CITE. The database will then generate the citation in the format that you request and you can copy and paste it into your list of references. Be sure to still check it though to make sure the formatting is correct.
