# WIRELESS PRINTING IN THE LIBRARY FROM PERSONAL LAPTOPS

UNH Students and Faculty now have the capability to send print jobs to the library printers. You will need to download the printer driver to your computer and then you'll be able to print your documents directly from your own computer immediately. The driver software is FREE and standard printing charges apply. You will be charged the appropriate amount, \$.08 per page for single sided or duplex (B&W), and \$0.50 per page for single sided or duplex for color.

Installation of the driver is fast and simple and you'll be able to immediately start printing. Download the file which is appropriate for your computer and run it. For Windows, double-click the file to run it.

An installation window will pop up to begin the driver installation. Follow the prompts and click Finish when instructed. The drivers are now downloaded and available for immediate use.

Printing from your Computer

The package installed two printers:

- Library Color Laser 4700- for color prints
- HP Laserjet 9040- for black and white prints

When you are ready to print from your computer, select the appropriate printer on the print screen of the program you are using (e.g. MS Word, Adobe Acrobat, etc.). After you have selected the printer, choose the remaining options (e.g. number of copies, which pages to print, single-sided or double-sided). When you have finished, click "Print" to send the print job to the printing station. You can then go to the corresponding print release station in the Library to retrieve your print job.

What are we reading...

## Baedeker's Guide to Venice

Vividly depicted in the current Library exhibit on travel literature, the interesting thing about travel guides is that they can be obsolete from one day to the next, or remain valid practically forever. Some of them even turn classic! One of those guides is Baedeker's Pocket Guide to Venice, published in 1984 (on the intermediate level of the Library, DG674.2 B34 1984). When first published, it was considered a new generation of city guides, small and easy to handle, with the main sights listed in alphabetical order, from Accademia to Zanipolo, preceded by a concise chapter on historical information and followed by useful practical information, equally in alphabetical order. There are no hot insider tips on where to eat or trod where (presumably) no other visitor has eaten or trodden before. There is no personal discourse on life-altering experiences or disappointed expectations or a list of the top 10 things to do. However, there are discreet ratings of some sights of particular interest or outstanding quality with a nod to the day tripper to Venice, and there are abundant illustrations of the sights and maps. It leaves the visitor feeling subtly reassured to be exploring Venice with a competent and unwavering guide in his or her hands – much as Karl Baedeker intended when he published his first travel guides more than 150 years ago.
