

Don't know how or where to begin your research? Check out "Starting Points"

If your professor has assigned a paper or project that requires scholarly sources and you don't know how to get started or where to look, turn to the UNH Library's Starting Points. The Starting Points are a collection of educational materials and self-help tutorials created by the librarians that are designed to teach students the strategies and techniques needed to perform research at the academic level. These materials are available online through the UNH Library LibGuide collection (<http://libguides.newhaven.edu>). Think of them as the frequently asked questions of the library. There are multiple sections to the Starting points that will take a student from the very basics of understanding the differences between types of sources all the way to using advanced searching techniques to search a database. Other sections include how to locate the appropriate resources, how to incorporate those sources into your work and cite the material, and there is even a section designed to improve your searching habits on the web. Whether you are a new student or finishing up your final semester, starting points can help you become a better researcher and save you a lot of time throughout your academic career and your life after college. By spending the time to look at these brief LibGuides, it will better improve the quality of your research and it will save you countless hours. 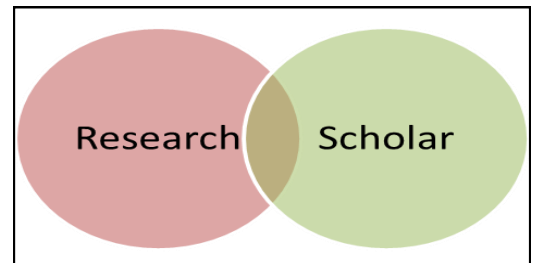

Did you know, you can access databases from smartphones and tablets from just about anywhere using your UNH ID and password? You can usually use your devices internet browser to access a library database, but some databases also have apps that you can download to your phone for easier access.

Below you can find a list of some of the databases that have a mobile app that you can download and where you need to go to download them.

The collection will be refreshed continuously as new bestsellers or greatly recommended books become available. The books are conveniently located on newly renovated lower level of the Library. To borrow them, bring them upstairs to the circulation desk and use your UNH ID to check them out just like you would with any other library book. Among the genres represented are biographies, popular fiction and historical fiction and more.

If “a grand adventure written on a canvas that probes the heart, weighs the soul and measures the human spirit across [centuries]” sounds appealing to you, you might enjoy “Written in my own heart’s blood” by Diana Gabaldon. It is the seventh title in this popular time travel fiction series by Gabaldon. For those of you who prefer your historical reading to be non-fiction, you may enjoy reading “The dog who could fly : the incredible true story of a WWII airman and the four-legged hero who flew at his side.” Or “The First Family detail : Secret Service agents reveal the hidden lives of the presidents”.

Maybe vampire fiction is more to your liking? In that case, be sure to read “Vampires of Manhattan: the new Blue Bloods coven” by Melissa de la Cruz as well as “American Vampire volume six” by Scott Snyder. Or are werewolves more your style? Then you’ll be sure to enjoy “Blood red” by Mercedes Lackey.

Do you relax by reading about sports? Here is one for you: “1954: the year Willie Mays and the first generation of black superstars changed major league baseball forever” by Bill Madden. It “describes the 1954 World Series, when two black players went with their division-winning teams, the New York Giants and the Cleveland Indians, to fight for the championship, seven years after Jackie Robinson broke the color line”.

Maybe you like to keep up with popular entertainers. We have selections by Neil Patrick Harris, Jenny McCarthy, Russell Brand and Lea Michelle.

Are you in the mood for a bit of self-help to help achieve those New Year Resolutions? Paul Dolan, PhD might just have the answer you’re looking for with “Happiness by design : change what you do, not how you think”.
