



CSI camp at University of New Haven

(WTNH) -- Future crime scene investigators are getting a chance to learn from one of the best in the business.

Eighteen year old Nate Dohna of New Haven is one of 30 teens taking part in the University of New Haven's first-ever crime scene investigation camp. Dohna hopes to become a member of the FBI Violent Crimes Unit or SWAT team.

"As you can see there is a lot of evidence to look at. This is really hands on and it gives me a chance to see if this is really what I want to do see if I want to continue in it," Nate said.

Teens from around the state also got a surprise visit from the renowned forensic scientist, Dr. Henry Lee. After all, it's his camp.

"There are so many professions to choose from but they all involve using logic," Dr. Lee said.

Using logic to solve this crime also involves not getting too star struck.

"To see him in the same room up that close, it's phenomenal, phenomenal," Nate said.

Dr. Lee's College of Criminal Justice and Forensic Sciences also has a national cold case unit at the University of New Haven and last year they solved 17-cold cases including the Penny Serra case out of New Haven.

The camp costs \$400 for the week.
