Financial Aid: Let's Review

You already know that a college education is a valuable investment and, while you must carefully consider the commitment it demands, a University of New Haven education is an investment in your student's future. Financing a college education is one of the most significant investments for a family. Although the thought of financing a college education may seem overwhelming, it can become more affordable with financial aid. Our financial aid staff is here to assist you, so please don't hesitate to contact us!

TO APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID:

- ▶ Complete and submit the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) at www.fafsa.gov. It is available each year on January 1.
- ▶ For students planning to enter UNH in the fall of 2014, **complete the 2014-2015 FAFSA.**
- ▶ The UNH priority date for completing the 2014-2015 FAFSA is **March 1, 2014.**
- ▶ The UNH School Code for the FAFSA is 001397.
- ▶ UNH will communicate with accepted students via email to request additional paperwork if necessary. You may be required to submit a Tax Return Transcript (obtained directly from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS)) and a UNH Verification Worksheet.
- ▶ Additional paperwork requested by UNH is required by **May 1, 2014.**
- ▶ The FAFSA must be completed **each year** for which the student is seeking financial assistance.

Financial Aid awards based on the results of the FAFSA are sent to students beginning in February and reflect the maximum financial aid for which the student has been determined eligible.

1 SEARCHING FOR PRIVATE SCHOLARSHIPS. These are scholarships from sources outside of the University. Private scholarships are awarded by businesses, organizations, civic groups, high schools, churches, religious organizations, and many other agencies. To search for private scholarships:

- A. Check with your high school guidance counselor's office.
- B. Check with community service organizations, civic groups, and religious organizations in which you are involved.
- C. Check with a parent's employer or union.

Beware of Scholarship Scams! You should NOT pay money to apply for scholarships! Never give your credit card or checking account information when applying for scholarships!

2 THE 10-MONTH PAYMENT PLAN THROUGH TUITION MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS (TMS). This is an interest-free alternative to lump-sum payments that are due at bill time. This option allows you to spread out your payments over a period of 10 months (July–April) and can limit the amount of loan money you may need to borrow. The enrollment fee is \$75. For more information, select “Payment Options” from the Bursar's Office webpage www.newhaven.edu/bursar.

3 THE FEDERAL DIRECT PARENT LOAN (PLUS). A financing option is available to parents of a dependent undergraduate student who is enrolled at least half-time and is making satisfactory academic progress. For 2013–2014, the interest rate is fixed at 6.41%. Parents who do not have an adverse credit history may borrow up to the annual total Cost of Attendance, less other financial aid received. 4 A PRIVATE ALTERNATIVE LOAN. These are credit-based loans where the student is the borrower. These loans will likely require a credit-worthy co-signer for the student to be approved. These loans must be repaid, and typically the student must be 18 years old to apply. Private loans offer varying terms and conditions set by the individual lender of the loan program and typically cost more than the educational loans offered by the federal government. The interest rates are pegged to either the Prime Lending Rate or the LIBOR index and may be fixed or variable. Time to Explore — Getting Off Campus

The University of New Haven's prime location is both an advantage for our current students and a draw for prospective students. We are located just ten minutes outside the cultural city of New Haven and about two miles from the beautiful Connecticut shoreline. But whether our students want to explore the many businesses along the Boston Post Road or enjoy the various restaurants, theaters, and museums in downtown New Haven, getting around is not a problem — we provide many types of transportation so that our students can enjoy the local area.

Our campus shuttle is a free mode of transportation for all current students — all they have to do is show their campus ID. The campus shuttle not only runs up and down the Boston Post Road to various locations but also to downtown New Haven and even the West Haven Train Station. Along the way, there are many important stops our students love to check out in the surrounding areas of West Haven.

Zipcar at the University of New Haven is a car-sharing program that all current students are eligible to sign up for. All they have to do to use one of the two Zipcars on campus is register online and reserve the car either by the hour or even for the day. There is a reservation fee, which includes fuel, insurance, and any needed maintenance on the vehicle. Our students find this to be a great way to get around the area, especially to locations that are beyond where our shuttle can take them.

Another option for transportation through the surrounding towns is the CTTransit U-Pass Program. Each residential student is given his or her pass upon moving into the residence hall for the school year. The pass gives them free access to CTTransit within the local area. Campus Access Services: Equal Access for All

The University of New Haven's Campus Access Services office (CAS) is the first stop on campus for students with disabilities or self-identified learning disorders. Located on the ground floor of Sheffield Hall, CAS is dedicated to helping UNH students attain equal access to all of the University's academic programs and campus services.

CAS provides its students with a wide range of services, both in and out of the classroom. Academic services include arranging additional time for testing, note taking, and reading assistance as well as coordinating the use of assistive software and technology. Additional accommodations

include coordinating access to the University's buildings and arranging for accessible rooms in campus housing.

According to the CAS web page, support services are provided free of charge to eligible students with disabilities that include, but aren't limited to, the following categories: learning disabilities; attention deficit disorders; vision, hearing, and speech impairments; head injuries and other health-related issues.

Eligible students can also participate in an additional CAS-sponsored new-student summer orientation program called D.R.E.A.M. — Defeating Roadblocks in Education through Awareness and Mentoring. This program offers students the opportunity to move into their residence hall

room a few days ahead of schedule, allowing them a little extra time on campus to acclimate before classes begin and familiarize themselves with campus resources.

Fast Track Study — Getting A Degree in Record Time

In today's fast-paced society, students are looking for innovative opportunities that will give them an edge over the competition. At the University of New Haven, students have an exciting option that allows them to accelerate their studies and potentially receive two degrees for the price of one — it's the Fast Track study program in the College of Business. This opportunity invites qualified students to complete their bachelor's degree in any

business major in three years — a full year earlier than in traditional bachelor's programs. Those students interested in committing to the traditional four years at UNH can use the extra year to pursue a Master in Business Administration (MBA) in accounting, management, marketing or finance. Students can earn graduate degrees in sports management and hotel and restaurant management within three trimesters (slightly over a year).

Is the Fast Track study program right for your student? It could be if he or she is the type of student who is driven, not afraid to work hard, and will actively pursue a career. The College of Business offers this opportunity to students with a minimum high school GPA of 3.2 on a 4.0 scale as well as a minimum

SAT score of 1100 (Critical Reading and Math sections combined) or ACT Composite score of 24. All applicants to the program are also required to interview with a member of the Office of Undergraduate Admissions staff.

Typically, students enter into the Fast Track program with an average of 12 college-level credits. These credits can come from Advanced Placement (AP) classes, International Baccalaureate (IB) classes, or through class credit from an accredited two- or four-year institution. Those students who have not achieved this

level of transferable credit must complete at least 12 credits during a combination of summer or intersession coursework (including UNH's very popular two-week study abroad trips).

Fast Track students must complete the required 18–19 course credits per semester and maintain a cumulative GPA of 3.0 to remain in the program. Although each student takes an extra class per semester, there are no additional charges, allowing students to take six classes virtually free of charge. Those students interested in diving into the workplace immediately after graduation will have saved a full year's worth of tuition, room, board, and student fees.

3RD ANNUAL College Of Business Scholarship Challenge

Students across the country hear it from parents and teachers alike on a daily (if not hourly) basis: Get off Facebook and other forms of social media. Well, if your student has already been accepted to our

College of Business, they are now eligible to put their time on social media to good use and potentially pay their way through college at the University of New Haven. For the third year in a row, the College of Business at UNH has issued a challenge to prospective students — show us that you have the potential to be a future business leader, and you may be the recipient of a full-tuition scholarship! The College of Business Scholarship Challenge asks students to

develop a plan for a business that they would like to create someday, use Facebook as a marketing platform for launching their future business, and tell us why and how their business will be successful. **Entries are being accepted from now until March 15, 2014.**

To help get your student started, here are the nuts and bolts of how the Challenge works:

STEP 1: Think of a business you would like to create someday. This could be a gourmet restaurant, a sports-marketing firm, a unique service provider, or even an Internet-based company. There is no limitation on the size or scope of the business. The only

requirements are that it is an original idea and that the student can provide a well thought-out explanation of what makes his or her business unique.

STEP 2: Compose a business plan detailing the organization in three pages or less. For the full parameters of the business plan, visit www.facebook.com/COBChallenge and click on the “Official Rules” tab.

STEP 3: Get creative! Spread the word about this fictional business by creating a Facebook business page for the company. Go to www.facebook.com/business/pages for tips on how to get a business page started. Students are not limited to using Facebook, but this should be their main marketing platform.

STEP 4: Submit your entry directly on the COB Challenge Facebook page and email your business plan separately to COBchallenge@newhaven.edu no later than March 15, 2014. The winner will be selected shortly after the deadline by the Dean of the College of Business and a panel of distinguished judges.

MAJOR SPOTLIGHT: FINANCE

Finance students like to solve puzzles and work with a team of others to solve puzzles. These puzzles are wide ranging. They can take the form of investment decisions on what types of securities to buy, decision models to buy capital equipment, decisions

to open new business lines, and more. Often these decision models concern the development of either a personal financial plan or a business plan for a corporation.

Our program is designed to give students the personal attention that will help them succeed in this field. Small class sizes ensure that

students get to know their instructors, and their instructors get to know them!

The program basically unfolds like this:

- 1 FRESHMAN YEAR WILL BE EXCITING.** Students will take core courses in economics and accounting and have the opportunity to study personal financial planning right away. They will get to know other new students and befriend upperclassmen by joining one of the many business-oriented student clubs and organizations — especially the very active Finance Club!
- 2 SOPHOMORE YEAR WILL BE CHALLENGING.** Students continue their studies with courses in management, marketing, accounting, and corporate finance. In our corporate finance course, students will use a unique data set of firm financial data and apply it to real situations. For example, one instructor's description of an assigned project from the course's current syllabus was: “For this report, you will play the role of a business consultant. You have been hired by a company (selected by the course instructor) to do an independent analysis of the company and the current business climate outlook that will affect both the company and its industry. Go.”
- 3 JUNIOR AND SENIOR YEARS GET EVEN MORE SERIOUS.** Core upper-level courses include international finance, institutions and markets, a second course in corporate finance, and security analysis/investments. These are the central part of our program. During junior and senior years, students are well prepared to take on an internship or co-op experience.
- 4 SUPPLEMENTARY COURSES AND ACTIVE CERTIFICATION PREPARATION ARE ALWAYS AN OPTION.** We offer our students access to a series of financial information systems courses that allow them to work with and become familiar with computer systems for large firms. Students can engage in a coaching course to help prepare them to pass Level I of the Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) exam, which will make a wider range of jobs accessible to them.



Hazell Nut Café and Jeffery's Fusion Restaurant

Founded in 2007, the Hazell Nut Café, named after distinguished alumnus Jeffery Hazell '83, is a full-service, student operated café — one of the first in the country — located directly on campus. The Hazell Nut Café, located in Maxcy Hall on the University of New Haven's main campus, features locally ground coffee, pizza, lobster rolls, sandwiches, pastries, and a variety of delicious foods you can order for a great price.

The recently renovated café has new equipment and an upgraded menu to provide a true restaurant-quality experience for students. Helping to reinforce the University's reputation as a leader in experiential education, students in our hospitality and tourism management programs intern at the café, learning how to manage and run their own business right on campus, concurrently with their classes. The Hazell Nut Café gives them first-hand experience in everything from food preparation, managing the budget, developing marketing strategies, and producing new menus to keep the customers coming back. Students acquire these career-building skills outside of the classroom, gaining a more in-depth understanding of what it takes to run a small business in the real world of this industry.

Students also gain experience through Jeffery's Fusion Restaurant, a fine-dining restaurant right on campus. Jeffery's Fusion was brought to life through a generous donation from Jeffery Hazell. The restaurant seats sixty and is located in Harugari Hall on the University of New Haven's South Campus. Jeffery's Fusion's customers include staff and students, as well as the local community. There is quite a buzz about the food, which includes such tempting dishes as lobster bisque, “Champagne Delight,” which is a sabayon cream dessert with fresh berries, and snapper de rojo.

Juline Mills, coordinator of the UNH hospitality and tourism program, believes that the students' work at Jeffery's Fusion better prepares them for the hospitality career field. Students learn about menu planning, various styles of tableside food service and develop skills that give them an edge over other graduates and job applicants in the field.

FACULTY PROFILE: AMIR ESMAILPOUR

Assistant Professor, Electrical and Computer Engineering and Computer Science



What is your educational background?

My interest in the field of engineering was sparked when I sent my first email. It was such a new concept (almost twenty years ago), and I wanted to learn more about data networking. I have B.S. and M.S. degrees from the University of Ottawa and Ryerson University, both in Canada. I completed my Ph.D. in Computer Science and Computer Engineering with a focus in IT and Telecommunication at the University of Guelph in Canada. My postdoctoral fellowship was done at the University of Toronto, where, years later, I also taught.

How long have you taught at UNH, and what courses do you teach?

I have been teaching at the University of New Haven for almost three years. I chose UNH because, as a smaller university, we are able to focus on teaching in the classrooms while offering students the opportunity to engage in research. We prepare our students for the industry. I teach all network engineering, telecommunication, wireless, and C++ programming courses. I am currently also working with several students on researching 4G wireless networks, their security, and quality of service.

What experience do you bring from the professional field into the classroom?

I worked at Nortel for over seven years as an Optical Works Administrator before transitioning to a position at Cisco and Daimler Chrysler in Toronto. I worked in their IT Department as a Senior Head Engineer in Networking. I was in charge of telecommunication and wireless networking — connecting, maintaining, and troubleshooting all of the plants to the head office through a wireless network.

What advice would you give to prospective students and their families?

Before choosing a program, try to set goals and long-term achievements for yourself to help figure out what you might want to do, career-wise. Make sure to ask yourself, “What will I be able to do with this degree in my life?” Look at the job market, and see if graduates are being hired from a specific program.

What are some fun facts about you?

I am a big fan of “The Simpsons.” Homer Simpson is my favorite character. While pursuing my Ph.D., I even used pictures and characters from the show during a presentation — everyone was laughing!

What advice would you give to an incoming student?

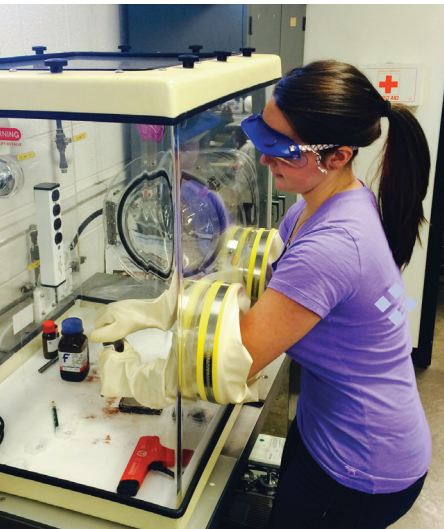

Living Learning Communities:

For many first-year students, it's a unique way to begin college life.

Living Learning Communities at the University of New Haven provide first-year students with outstanding, out-of-class, co-curricular, and residential experiences. Built around an academically based or interest-based peer group, the community affords participants with additional faculty interaction, collaboration with students within the major course of study, and a variety of activities to complement in-class assignments and pertinent current topics.

Students within the Living Learning Community live on a common floor with a Residential Life staff member that has been specially selected to work with that particular LLC.

In addition, faculty work together with the staff from the Office of Residential Life to use the residence hall space as a setting for co-curricular and social programming, based on that LLC community's academic or interest group.

Living Learning Communities were introduced at UNH in 2007. Only 60 students were involved that year. Last year, there were 505 students participating in the 15 Living Learning Communities that UNH offers. For the 2014-2015 academic year, the Living Learning Communities will be housed in four of our freshman residence halls, including three LLCs in our brand new residence hall scheduled to open in Fall 2014!



Athletics: A Two-Season Summary

FALL RECAPS

The Chargers' volleyball program, led this past fall by Head Coach Robin Salters '91, captured its second consecutive Northeast-10 Conference Championship and qualified for the NCAA postseason for the eighth straight season — advancing to the NCAA Div. II East Region Championship Match. Amber Cannady '14 led the Chargers on the court with two All-America honors, including First Team recognition by Daktronics, Inc.

On the gridiron this fall, a win over Assumption as a part of Northeast-10 Championship Weekend staked New Haven football to an 8-3 final record; the Chargers have won eight or more contests in each of the last four seasons. Mike DeCaro '14 and Michael Flacco '16 each collected All-America nods and Najae Brown '17 was named the Don Hansen Football Gazette National Freshman of the Year in addition to Northeast-10 Rookie of the Year honors.

New Haven women's soccer completed its most successful season as a member of the Northeast-10 Conference, finishing with a record of 11-5-3. The 2013 Chargers began the fall with a program-record eight-match unbeaten streak and won the first NE-10 postseason match in team history with a 5-1 triumph at Merrimack in the quarterfinal round. Monica Yanez '14 and Amber Simms '15 each garnered First Team All-Northeast-10 laurels as the team's high-scoring starting forwards. Simms added Daktronics Honorable Mention All-America honors and Yanez collected an Academic All-America selection for her performance in the classroom.

WHERE THE BRAINS ARE

The women's tennis team went 5-2 overall with a 3-2 Northeast-10 mark in the fall portion of its schedule. Eva Rybka '16 was twice named Northeast-10 Player of the Week for the Chargers, who begin their spring slate on March 23 at Merrimack.

Rounding out the fall were the men's and women's cross country teams. Both squads competed at the Northeast-10, New England, and NCAA Div. II East Region Championships.

WINTER UPDATE

On the track, six-time All-America sprinter Ada Udaya '15 has already confirmed her return to the NCAA Championships for New Haven's women's indoor track and field team. She ran a blazing 7.41 seconds in the 60-meter dash to automatically qualify for the national meet and has posted a provisional qualifying time in the 200-meter dash. Ivy Watts '15 (400-meter dash) and the duo of Briana Conyers '15 and Tiara Mitchell '15 (triple jump) have all met provisional qualifying standards for the NCAA Championship in their respective events. For the Charger men's track and field team, Matthew Jeune '15 has returned from an injury that sidelined him for all of last season to meet the NCAA provisional qualifying mark in the high jump.

A pair of career milestones highlights a successful start to the season for New Haven men's basketball. With a 21-point effort on January 8, Jeffery Adkins '14 became the 33rd member of the Chargers' 1,000-Point Club and has since risen into the top-25 all-time at New Haven. Eric Anderson '15 is among the nation's leaders in rebounds, blocked shots, and double-doubles, and the Chargers are collectively one of the top defensive teams in Division II.

First-year head coach Ty Grace '99 led New Haven women's basketball to its best start since 2006-07 as the Chargers look to repeat and improve upon last winter's return to the NE-10 postseason. With only one senior in the starting lineup, New Haven began the campaign at 4-0 and has established its place near the top of the Northeast-10 Southwest Division. Both Briana Bradford '16 and Aquillin Hayes '15 guided the offense with several 20-point performances apiece this season.
