# Moving Forward

with Determination and Purpose

The past year has been one of change and renewal at the University of New Haven.

As called for in the University's blueprint for the future — its four Strategic Directions — new buildings, classrooms, laboratories, programs, study-abroad opportunities, experiential learning initiatives and increased academic and athletic challenges have been added to a lengthening list of improvements and enhancements.

The University is truly an institution moving forward with determination and purpose.

## Strengthen Core Programs

### **Connect Globally**

- Students embrace study-abroad opportunities throughout the world, including in China, Dubai/Oman, England, France, Honduras, Italy, Romania, Russia and San Salvador. Study-abroad spills over into the summer: Business students to China, Visual Arts students to Italy, Russian language students to Moscow.
- University College offers intersession and summer courses globally, enrolling 172 students in courses offered by UNH's study-abroad partner, Cultural Experiences Abroad.
- The number of students immersed in language courses more than triples as the College of Arts and Sciences expands instruction to seven modern languages.
- The Henry C. Lee College of Criminal Justice creates international internships in National Security, Criminal Justice and Forensic Science, continues a successful joint program for students and faculty with the Medical College of Verona, and supports new faculty research in human trafficking and trans-national crime.
- The hugely successful Freshman Study Abroad program ignites further interest. Twenty topperforming freshmen travel to Roehampton University in London for fall semester study, up from 13 in 2007-2008; 80 are wait-listed.
- The University's Theatre Program wins accolades and inclusion in theatre competitions from the prestigious Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C.

### Train for the Millennium

- The Department of Education increases its graduate degree offerings to address a regional teacher shortage, expands its five-year teaching internship program to include a greater number of Connecticut school districts, and wins two grants to further educate science teachers in West Haven and New Haven.
- The Engineering and Science University Magnet School opens in West Haven September 4 to widespread acclaim. See story page 6.
- The University hosts popular summer camps focusing on visual and musical arts, crime scene investigation and engineering and science.
- University College adds accelerated degree programs in Paralegal Studies, Public Administration for Healthcare Professionals and, online, Dental Hygiene, two new M.B.A. Emerging Leaders cohort programs and a new Education master's cohort.







# Lead in Experiential Learning



- National Society for Experiential Education recognizes UNH as a national leader and names the University its Northeast Partner; Associate Provost Christie Boronico joins society's board, 15 faculty and staff members graduate from Experiential Education Academy.
- The Tagliatela College of Engineering increases student-industry initiatives, including having students create mechanical devices to ease the work of employees challenged with physical and mental disabilities at a New Britain non-profit.
- Twelve top students are elected as President's Public Service
  Fellows, fanning out into the community to work at community and public-service agencies.





- Eighteen students engage in summer research projects, overseen by a faculty mentor, up from 11 students in 2007-2008.
- Dental Hygiene Department professor accompanies six

UNH students to Romania and five to Honduras to provide dental services to impoverished children and adults.

- The College of Business establishes position of College Director of the Undergraduate
   Experience, fueling initiatives including a dean's student-intern program, a corporate challenge,
   a College of Business Living-Learning Community and more.
- The Henry C. Lee College of Criminal Justice and Forensic Sciences creates four service-learning courses, two of which enable students to assist state and local agencies in investigating cold cases and wrongful convictions.

- Two new Living-Learning Communities, Music and Sophomore Living, are created.
- University contracts with ELS, a top English as a Second Language provider.
- UNH teams begin to compete in the academically strong and athletically competitive Northeast-10.
- Tagliatela College of Engineering students excel in Concrete Canoe competition.
- University College increases student participation in Career Coaching program and launches Mentor Match, in which students are paired with mentors.
- As part of the Common Read program, first-year students read Dr. Khaled Hosseini's critically acclaimed work, "The Kite Runner."
- Academic and Student Affairs educates students on perils of alcohol and substance abuse, enhances programs designed to help sophomores transition to junior year and expands student leadership training.





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### Invest in Facilities rection 4 and Technology to Support Growth A \$46 million residence hall with apartment-style suites rises on campus. A \$1 million state-of-the-art media center, in which all communication technologies including radio, TV, newspapers and the Internet converge, opens in Maxcy Hall. A burn laboratory on wheels is created in the barn behind Echlin Hall, enabling Fire Science students to investigate fires on site. The Ralph F. DellaCamera Stadium features a new Sprinturf field in blue, one of UNH's school colors. A new building for the Henry C. Lee Institute of Forensic Science enters the design stages. A new Systems Engineering lab is constructed. Bartels Hall, the campus center, undergoes a makeover, with new technology and furnishings.
