Library Game Collection

Resources

Library Guides

You can access these services using the links under the gold Resources or Library Guides sections on the Library page of the myCharger portal.

- The Class Librarian Program: Class Librarians work with specific courses to make sure you understand how to find and evaluate the information you need. Your Class Librarian information should be on your syllabus or in your Blackboard course space. Found under the Faculty Resources Tab on our Libguides page.
- Use our Research Guides: These research guides were created using the online program Lib-Guides and are available to get you started with your research, even if you have never used a library or library resources before. We also can create Class Specific guides when working with individual instructors.
- ♦ Meet with us virtually through our new Ask a Librarian Chat Reference service or through the Zoom Web conferencing Software: A University of New Haven librarian can chat with you through the new Ask A Librarian Chat service or hold a Zoom video conferencing meeting with you. Both options allow us to walk you through the search process or troubleshoot issues. The Ask a Librarian Chat allows you to send screenshots, while the Zoom web conferencing software allows you to view the librarians' screen or us to view yours in real time..
- The Research Request Consultation Form: Specify how you would like one on one assistance, by filling out this request form which can be accessed through the library page in myCharger.
- Meet with a student researcher through our Researcher-2-Researcher program. Are you a student who needs help with research and would rather work with a fellow student rather than a librarian? If you want to request a research appointment with a Researcher-2-Researcher student, fill out the Research Request Consultation form.
- Contact us via social media. The library has a Facebook Page (Marvin K. Peterson Library University of New Haven) and a Twitter account (UNewHaven_Library).
- Send us an email. Email libraryhelp@newhaven.edu. The next available librarian will receive your question.
